

TREASURER'S REPORT

Financially 1989 has not been as successful as 1988. The main revenue raisers have been Tattersalls' Hotel weekly raffles, instant party raffle, and bar takings.

On behalf of the Committee I would like to sincerely thank all those members who conducted the Tattersalls' raffle each Friday. Up to 8th September our net income was \$4,900, this figure is up on the 1988 figure due to the monster Christmas raffle. This income is extremely valuable to the Club so keep up to good work.

Food and beverage sales were reasonable, with a net profit of \$3,486. This being approximately the same as 1988 figures. This is the direct result of very poor weather conditions for most of the season, which kept most rugby spectators indoors.

A disappointing aspect of our finances is our shortfall between the monies collected for registration and the fees charged by the I.D.R.U. Fees collected totalled \$2,795. The Club paid I.D.R.U. fees of \$3,100 - a shortfall of \$305 - so if you are one who has not paid his fees please hand it to a Club Committee person.

At present I am unable to give a full statement of the Club's finances as a formal audit has not been conducted.



Tech Rugby Club life member Wayne "The Brain" Boardman has been playing the game for 23 years and on Saturday will play his 400th grade game for the club.

Wayne will become only the second player in the Illawarra to make it to his 400th game. Ironically, his Tech clubmate Rick Boyle is the other.

Tech publicity officer Will Madden said Wayne played his 100th game in 1971, 200th in 1978, and 300th in 1983.

"Wayne has been actively involved in the club as a committee member, coach and player, and is one of Tech's most liked and most respected members," Madden said.

"He started his playing career like most novices — out on the wing. But the desire to chase the ball all over the park showed he was keen on a move into the pack.

"He played anywhere from wing to breakaway to the front row, and his skills kept him in first grade for many years."

Madden said Wayne was not satisfied with just playing and formed a junior team within the club.

"With the help of his wife Cath, and other friends and relatives, Wayne formed a junior side and acted as their coach, manager, strapper and chauffeur," he said.

"Initially there was no junior competition in the Illawarra and he drove the boys to Sydney in search of a game.

"He coached Tech's juniors for 11 years and to his credit, at least three of his understudies went on to play for NSW Country."

Wayne was honoured by the club last October when he became a life member, and the club will hold a function for him after he plays for Tech's third grade side against Vikings at Saunders Oval on Saturday.

Wayne's one last wish is to play rugby with his son Adam.


