

## 1st Grade Managers Report 2018

#### **Overview:**

The intention this season was to build the club and our teams to be substantially more competitive then the last few seasons. With some trepidation the decision to nominate 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 1<sup>st</sup>grade teams in the 2018 season was taken by our club committee.

This decision proved to be very positive overall, although the coaches and team managers found it a little disorganized due to lack of player numbers on occasions. It should be said however that those players who did turn up for training and playing commitments on a regular basis did the club and themselves proud in all the games that were played.

The results that all three teams achieved did go some way to impact on the club objective of each team being very competitive, but unfortunately on a number of occasions it could be considered that our teams were a little unlucky not to get the desired game results.

The recruitment program to entice new players into our playing ranks also proved beneficial with a few new players with natural skills and abilities lifting the teams to be a more competitive playing group.

We were also very fortunate to have a number of younger players come to our club. Although lacking rugby knowledge and corresponding skills, they proved they will be much better players if they dedicate the necessary time and motivation to the game, hopefully with our club. If we can retain these players and built on our efforts this season there is no reason why our teams and club could not be the competition leaders in the rugby seasons to come.

As Manager of 1<sup>st</sup> grade, I can honestly say we did our club proud and proved we were not the competition easy beats. Yes, we did let ourselves down in certain games but that happens in team games for any number of reasons, some of which I mention in this report. I say this not as a criticism but as a prompt for those who wish to think of themselves as 1<sup>st</sup> grade players, for them to consider what they achieved personally and what they contributed to the team overall. Ask yourself, can I improve, do I want to do better? All it takes is your time and effort.

I'm very grateful for the assistance received through the season from a number of club members. I can't cover all individually but hopefully you know who you are. Please know, I am grateful for your help and you do make our club a better place. Some I would like to mention.

Collectively, the Club Committee, who do a great deal behind the seen, keeping our club as a viable and successful rugby club. We always require individuals to put their hand up for committee, take on an active role, and make it all work. Rugby doesn't happen if there is no overriding structure to make it happen. "So, we can play and enjoy our rugby".

Wayne Ireland, who is by far the guru of Club Registrar's in Illawarra, if not all NSW country. This is in addition to a number of other responsibilities he undertakes like being our club's authorized "Licensee", being the Club Statistician, keeping all the game information or acting as team manager when required.

Robyn Letham, who rightly deserves special mention for her dedication to the many jobs she does week in, week out. One of which was to take over the running, stocking and control of the canteen, when Vice-President Graham Letham was unable to carry-on, due to an accident.

Robyn, also made time to clean the dressing rooms and club, before each home game, which is a major undertaking in itself. Yes, she did have help but it would not have happened without her, she also took to the B-B-Q on occasions. Many thanks Robyn, you're a champion.

The  $2^{nd}$  grade Team Manager, Rob Kelly helped greatly in asking his players to stand-by for  $1^{st}$  grade. I would also like to thank those  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  grade players who sat on the  $1^{st}$  grade bench following their game or when selected as replacements in  $1^{st}$  grade.

The 1<sup>st</sup> grade team requires an off-field leader to provide an atmosphere where individuals can bring and hone their skills. The 1<sup>st</sup> grade squad has a number of experienced players mixed in with younger players that have proven their raw talent and will continue to improve as they learn and gain experience. However, we can claim such players have already improved as rugby players this season and look forward to next season, when hopefully they return.

We have been fortunate to have such an off-field leader in Eliot O'Donnell as Club and 1<sup>st</sup> grade coach. He has promoted a team dynamic in which the whole team has one goal, to do their best and help the team will win. Eliot has held this position for two seasons and we are a better club for his input in rebuilding the club's playing roster while providing the necessary knowledge, experience and "what it takes" to be a 1<sup>st</sup> grade rugby player. Thank you, Eliot, I sincerely hope you and your family stay involved in our club, as you have a lot to offer.

#### General team and game overview.

Our 1<sup>st</sup> grade team were very unlucky in a number of hard-fought encounters with some of the stronger teams in the competition. The old saying "if only" comes to mind if but we have to be realistic. As your team manager and looking to the future, I am now being critical of some aspects of our game that may go a long way, hopefully, to pointing out what you already know. Playing rugby is a team game, but with each player bringing their individual skills and knowing what their part is in bringing those skills into a collective team base, doing what is required in gaining the ball then using and protecting it to give the team the advantage in scoring. Sounds easy, but much harder to implement.

This could be for any number of reasons such as, lack of experience in tight situations or

being too eager when a better opportunity would present itself with a little more composure and patience, or taking a poor option or decision when under pressure and losing forward momentum.

Other influences that turn a game are understanding the basic laws of rugby and reducing our mistakes which we control. Not providing opportunities for the referee to make very poor decisions which doesn't help at crucial times. (dare I say, even awarding the opposition tries when it was quite clearly, not a try. In our Uni. & Avondale games) I have to say though, if we had been able to keep our full team on the paddock week in and week out all training together and committed to each week's game, we most certainly would at the very least, be in the semi-finals.

I think we all would agree this team had opportunities to do better as a team, showing great promise early in the season with good attendance at training and displaying the determination and knowledge it takes to win games.

The disappointing aspect was that we didn't continue to be as committed, with a drop off in training attendance and not being fully committed to your team and club by ensuring your Saturdays were dedicated to playing 1<sup>st</sup> grade rugby.

Personal fitness dropped off, which was evident late in the more intense games allowing other teams to run over the top of us late in the game, to get the win.

Injury is of course a concern, especially when it may take weeks or longer to allow injured players to train and play. Unfortunately, we had a few such injuries. However, this provided the opportunity for the Coach to look at other players who, under normal circumstances would be placed in lower grades to gain the experience and required rugby skills and knowledge for first grade.

We were very fortunate to gain the services of a few new younger players who have proved that they will be much better rugby players in the years to come based on their individual abilities and the experience and knowledge they gained this season.

I would like to finish my report by saying, even with all my honest analysis of our season, I was pleased to act as your manager watching and receiving great personal satisfaction in having some input and where possible assisting the 1<sup>st</sup> grade team and all who put the jumper on to play 1<sup>st</sup> grade.

I sincerely hope you all return next year to build on what was achieved this season, continuing to take our club back to where we would all like to be, at the top of Illawarra Rugby.

I have deliberately not mentioned individual players in these notes as it's not intended to praise or criticise individual players, our game is a team endeavour with input from all who take to the field, each player is only one part of the whole team. #### Reflection on our season

1<sup>st</sup> game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 19, Bowral 37.

Played well, showed glimpses of real ability-but also need to be more consistent in controlling the ball, to many dropped passes in the ruck area with certain forwards consistently losing the ball when tackled or trying to get the ball away every time, instead of controlling the placement and protection of the ball. A couple of our new backs showed real promise with hard running for the try line. The whole backline needs to know, what to do and when, we squandered a number of opportunities through lack of experience. Overall if we can build on what was on show today the team will do well. I hope.

2<sup>nd</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 35, Kiama 6.

The team played in very windy conditions and played pretty-well considering, but the coach has a number of issues, hopefully he can improve our attack and control in the ruck. It may look ok if just going by the result we had enough ball to score a few more tries but didn't execute very well due to bad decision making and poor overall team discipline. If we want to win upcoming games we need to do the little things better and be more consistent in controlling the ball.

3rd game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 20, Shoalhaven 31.

Overall this was a very disappointing game, we worked down into to their territory numerous times, getting into their danger zone and then push unnecessary passes instead of keeping control and mounting controlled pressure. We seemed to drop a lot of ball every time we had opportunities to mount an attack, in both forwards and in the backs. The disappointment came not from the team effort but from the lack of judgement and individual skill levels.

4<sup>th</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 36, Camden 10.

Our team started very slowly allowing Camden to score two tries in the first twenty minutes. However, we slowly got into our own stride scoring two tries and converting them, we should have scored another two but the referee allowed Camden to continually infringe stopping play and giving us penalties, which should have been tries.

He should have also given a yellow card to stop this tactic as it continued for most of the game. Half-time score was 18-10 to us, after half-time the boys lifted and started moving the ball around scoring three more tries and a penalty (finally a yellow card) Camden had no

answer to our backs running attack with the forwards providing quick ball allowing the backs to infiltrate their defence, final score 36-10. We were showing improvement from the previous weeks.

#### 5<sup>th</sup> game. LOST – Tech-Waratahs 27, Avondale 29.

Once again, a very windy day at Avondale. Our team were up for this one and played with sprit and the will to win, it was very evident early on in the game. Our players were playing with commitment getting up in their face quickly and stopping their attack early. This approach proved we were able to match the opposition and in fact outplay them, scoring three tries and playing over the top of them. As is Avondale's usual game strategy, when they are being outplayed they resort to their very aggressive and over exuberant smash tackling, late tackling and less than sportsman like conduct.

A number of yellow cards at the very least should have been used but dare I say, the referee was very slow to act in stopping their style of play, which did slow our momentum down, heading into half-time leading 22-12.

The second half started badly with our players seemingly having gone to sleep after the break allowing Avondale to control the ball and penetrate our defence with ease. It appeared to be a totally different group of players that played so well both in defence and attack in the first part of the game.

Standing on the sideline, we could feel the momentum of the game changing as Avondale pressed forward we were on the back foot waiting for them to run rather than moving up and stopping their attacks early with good defence and pressure.

They ran in three tries, we managed to score one in response, we were still leading on the scoreboard with four tries, two conversions, one penalty, they required another try to win. We felt time was almost up and we could hold on but the referee allowed play to continue they went wide with their winger pressing to score in the corner, he was tackled as he went for the corner but appeared to drop the ball before grounding. The try was awarded score was 27-29. Our boys took the play into Avondale's danger zone, once again the late tackles and off-side play, finally the referee penalized them. A penalty approximately twenty-three metres out almost centre field. The kick was taken heading for the goal but just went to the left of the left-hand upright, no-goal, they win 27-29.

One that we should have won, overall the boys played their hearts out but a few lapses in defence with some very questionable game management decisions from the referee proved our downfall.

#### 6<sup>th</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 36, Campbelltown 12.

Following last week's disappointing loss our boys were going into this game very confident. Our forwards played the set plays really well and were able to control the ball feeding the backs, who were able to attack deep into the opposition's territory.

Both forwards and backs were able to get into scoring positions keeping pressure on Campbelltown for periods of time until opportunities opened up providing results. Three

tries, two conversions and a penalty at half-time was the result, with Campbelltown scoring a try and conversion.

Second half, continued much the same with our boys lifting a gear, to out muscle the opposing forwards and running good lines in general play to out run their defence, scoring three more tries and a conversion. Overall the forwards scored four tries and the backs two tries providing some insight into the way the game unfolded, with our forwards having some dominance in the set plays as well as in general play.

**7**<sup>th</sup> game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 34, University 41 No summary, except to say the team played well under the circumstances on the day, and we could have won. We had a number of opportunities but just made bad individual decisions, which could have resulted in a positive game result.

#### 8<sup>th</sup> game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 16, Vikings 21

Unfortunately, we had two of our more dominant players out with injuries making changes necessary both in the forwards and backs. The team played really well in phases of play scoring the first try and converting. Our defence was challenged on numerous occasions by their number 9 and 15 who found space but we were able to repel them each time. The first half was ours, leading 13-7.

The second half was a torrid effort with both teams doing well with the ball in hand, however we seemed to get penalized much more then Vikings for the same offence of not rolling away, they always took the longer approach to slow the ball down, which was very frustrating in that it allowed Vikings to disrupt our ability to get quick ball. We were still leading with six minutes of injury time already played 16-14.

Our time-keeping for stoppages was lucky to be three minutes, we couldn't believe we were still playing that length of time, anyway Vikings ran the ball wide and our defence got caught out missing one tackle allowing their winger to score in the corner which was converted, game over they win 21-16.

Very disappointing, this is the third time we should have won the games against the top three teams. They all won the game in the last couple of minutes of these games, we don't seem to get any of those 50/50 referee calls to go our way, late in the game.

#### 9<sup>th</sup> game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 15, Bowral 41

On a very cold and windy day, we had the worst game of our season to date. It became very apparent not long after the start of the game the majority of our players didn't want to be there, they just weren't switched on with a lot of missed one-on-one tackles. It appeared from the sideline that we had already decided not to be committed or defend our position. Bowral players seemed to be running and scoring at will without any real opposition, it was hard to watch, they scored four tries and a conversion, we finally got into their danger zone and received a penalty which was converted, half-time score TW-3, Bowral 22.

It was very noticeable which of our players were trying to stem the ease with which Bowral were playing, one back in particular was making

tackle after tackle with little help from his fellow backs who were missing in action. He even continued with a strapped badly fractured finger for the majority of the game. The second half was a little more competitive although in all honestly, I think Bowral took their foot of the pedal knowing they were well and truly in control of the game. We finally scored a couple of tries and a conversion. The overall effort and display today was certainly not of 1<sup>st</sup> grade standard, we know our players are better than this, overall a very disappointing day, with the final score TW 15, Bowral 41.

#### 10<sup>th</sup> game. LOST – Tech-Waratahs 10, Shamrocks 39.

We had lost three in a row, it was felt that in this game we could turn it around. It started very slowly from our side with missed tackles once again causing us to chase their players, rather than stopping them from mounting their attacking backline, we allowed their speedy players to much ground to run around our outside backs.

We were trying but the missed tackles and dropped ball was presenting Shamrocks far too much ball, allowing them to mount pressure for long periods of time to eventually find the defence wanting, they score two tries, two conversions and a penalty.

We showed glimpses of our own attack by scoring two tries by our young guns on the wings we had a couple of times where the referee indicated, held up over the try line, although our players said one of these should have been a try. Half-time score TW 10, Shamrocks 17. We were still in the game on the score board, but second-half Shamrocks lifted their pace and speed in the ruck and maul to take advantage of us not protecting what should have been our ball. We couldn't match them in the set plays especially our lineouts which we lost far too many times, when we could have mounted serious attacks on their try line. Given the amount of ball and the speed of their game we just couldn't hold them which allowed both their backs and forwards to score four additional tries, converting three of them to take the final score to TW- 10, Shamrocks 39.

#### 11<sup>th</sup> game. LOST -Tech-Waratahs 12, Kiama 14.

Kiama had not been travelling very well and we thought for sure this one was in the bag. The game started well-enough with our team being a little down on experience, due to injuries and representative commitments allowing Kiama's forwards to outclass us in the forwards both in the rucks and mauls. They were quicker to engage and control the outcome due to their forwards taking the initiative away from us on too many occasions, by allowing them to push us off our ball, with a second push.

However, we did get enough ball to make some inroads through our backs allowing our wingers to score two tries one of which was converted. Kiama also scored a try and conversion just prior to half-time with the score TW 12 – Kiama 7.

Following the break Kiama took full advantage of the wind and played in our half of the field for long periods and eventually scored a try out wide which was converted score 12-14. We had a number of scoring opportunities to get over the line but lack of discipline and patience squandered these, which would have made the difference. Kiama pressed our

defence but our boys defended really well on our try line for long periods and they were denied any further points.

Just minutes left in the game for the win, we mounted a strong attack to get within ten metres of their try line with all the momentum going forward we had the advantage but the referee decides to give us a penalty, two minutes to go the kick had to be taken. Approximately twenty-five metres out and to the right about fifteen meters, the kick was heading for the black dot but at the last moment went to the left, game over they win 12-14.

#### 12<sup>th</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 27, Shoalhaven 14.

This turned out to be one of our better games so far this season although we had three of our more notable players out injured. This was a home game and the winds were very strong and blustery with Shoalhaven using the wind to their advantage gaining easy ground with down field kicks.

Our team were much more tuned into the game this week with good defence and better control of the ball. Our forwards were playing with commitment and matching their opposition in the tight play. The half-time score was in our favour 15-14, we scored three tries to Shoalhaven with two tries and a conversion.

Second half was similar to the first, but we had the wind advantage which we could have utilised a little smarter than we did. We were running the ball with a more determined attitude allowing us to score a further three tries, converting one, adding to the score now 27-14. The boys were required to defend their try line with great defence which was a highlight of our game. Our tries were divided between the forwards and the backs, with the after-match atmosphere really good to see after the previous four weeks without a win. I hope we can keep this going forward for next few weeks, they were good to watch today.

13<sup>th</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 29, Campbelltown 27. We still had a number of players out this week for various reasons. The game started with Campbelltown's big forwards playing close to the mauls holding the ball and controlling play going forward. They are big people although our lads tried to contain them it was near impossible their size and weight took its toll and eventually our defence broke down allowing them to get clean ball to their backs two of which were very quick and were able to get deep into our red zone, although, I have to say we defended really well on our line for numerous phases before they scored next to the sideline.

We were under pressure for most of the first-half but to their credit our players were able to score two good tries to Campbelltown's three tries a penalty and a conversion, half-time score 10-20 to them.

Second half with a little wind at our backs we were able to turn the tables a little, so much so two of their players should have received at least "yellow cards" for head-high tackles but the young referee gave them warnings instead, we received two penalties one of which we converted the other got us into their red zone but we were unable to capitalise.

Campbelltown lifted and through everything they could muster to finally break our defence scoring wide out and converting the kick.

Approximately twenty minutes to go, an individual run broke through their line and straight passed their defence, we scored under the posts score 22-27. We had other opportunities presented to us but these were missed. With only minutes to go we finally got another opportunity the backs capitalized and scored a try. Score 27-27 we had the conversion wide out near the sideline to win the game, the kick was taken we held our breath as it sailed over the black dot, whistle blew game over, good guys win 29-27. Good gutsy win.

14<sup>th</sup> game. WON - Tech-Waratahs 44, Camden 10. This was "Sponsors day" at Saunders Oval and I was very pleased for all the players and the team as they performed with great determination and showed what they could do to opposing sides when they played to their abilities. The game was great to watch and the boys achieved the win by scoring seven tries, three conversions and one penalty, Camden scored two tries. This game really highlighted what could have been for the team this season, with a little luck and a lot more of what's required to play first grade and get a winning result.

15<sup>th</sup> game. LOST - Tech-Waratahs 8, Avondale 31. Once again, the team was changed due to injuries or other reasons. Avondale started with very strong forward play with their big forwards taking control of the scrums and utilizing their abilities to control the rucks by very often holding our players off the ground to get the advantage, they were doing this continuously as our players couldn't get to the ground quick enough they just held them up until the referee blew the whistle.

We had very little opportunities or control of the game, Avondale were just too strong for our players to handle and compete, with our defence falling away and a lot of missed tackles due to going high rather than around their ankles, easier said than done I know, but that is the only way to stop them, as they just keep running or walking.

This was a hard day at the office for the boys of course they tried at various times during the game but the opposition were just too strong and committed not to let us get into the game. Maybe it was, they used our previous game against them to realize we had the ability to make it hard for them. This game proved to be a completely different Avondale than the first encounter with them where we outplayed them, when they just scrapped home with a questionable try being given very, very late in the game.

**16**<sup>th</sup> game. LOST -Tech-Waratahs 32, University 33. I know, I said I wasn't going to mention players but I do think Mick Bruton should get a rap for playing his "300 games" in this match against University. Well done Mick, Congratulations.

This game was a tense, hard fought game with the running phases being expansive and both teams being relatively equal to the challenge. However, I have to say the referee made a number of crucial judgements which effectively halted our ability to mount consistent pressure at crucial times in University red zone. The first-half finished 10-12 to University, they scored two tries and one conversion. We scored two tries.

The second half reflected the first-half with the penalty count against us at 3 to 1, it seemed every time we mounted an attack the referee found something to penalize for, even the University supporters did say they couldn't understand some of his decisions, but were grateful he did.

On occasions we did let ourselves down, we were able to win the ball on the ground but then allowed Uni's forwards to put on a second push, we didn't have the sufficient forwards to counter act protecting the ball, so we lost it far too many times.

The score board indicated that each team lead at various times with a number of changes throughout. They would score a try we would respond with our own on three separate occasions with each team scoring three tries, we also converted two and kicked a penalty, they converted their three tries.

Unfortunately, we had three players injured within minutes of each other, which did affect our ability to consolidate when we had opportunities to score tries. We could have won this game as with others we just couldn't control the pressure due to inexperience and taking unnecessary options when control and pressure on their line would have been the better option.

The biggest mistake this referee made on the day was to award the last try to University after their player received a clearly forward pass, the linesman who was a University person to his credit, immediately raised his flag were the pass happened five-metres out from the try line, this referee chooses to ignore his linesman's flag and awarded the try. The linesman continued to hold his flag out went onto the field, spoke to the referee and tell him it was clearly a forward-pass; the referee ignored this law of the game allowing

It didn't take long to see their intention was to run us around, it was also obvious that they were much more intent in their willingness to get to the breakdowns to win the ball. This is not to say we let them just dominate, as we had occasions when we had them on the ropes but just couldn't finish it off. They scored a try and converted it took some time for us to start to get clean ball allowing the forwards to take it forward. About 20minutes in we had a scrum in their danger zone which we won picked up at the back and drove within five metres of their line, recycled the ball and with good support scored a try which was converted. Shamrocks came back very strongly running the ball wide on numerous

occasions trying our defence which was holding up reasonably well, but eventually a tackle was missed and it was a two on one run to the try line which he ran around to place down five metres near the posts. This was the half-time score 7-12 to them.

One of our problems we seemed to lose a lot of our lineouts giving them our ball which was hearting us greatly especially when we had opportunities near their try line.

Second-half Shamrocks were able to retrieve the ball by pushing us back off the ball, which we have had a problem with all season.

My opinion is our forwards were thinking about running the ball before we actually had ensured control of it from the contest on the ground or in the maul.
