TREASURER'S REPORT

Since my report in the last Year Book there has been significant progress made both financially and in the direction of establishing a solid foundation for the Club on Keira Oval. Both are very closely related of course.

The Illawarra Hotel and its patrons are once again the major source of our income and this year has probably been our most successful from raffles. I would like to extend my thanks to Lloyd Callender and his drinkers for their generosity and also to the few (unfortunately) of our chaps who regularly sacrificed their valuable time to sell the tickets. We have taken slightly in excess of \$3,100 (gross) from raffles since the Annual General Meeting.

The Illawarra Master Builders Club is also responsible in no small way for the successful functioning of our club. Their annual allocation which covers the cost of our football jumpers is very much appreciated and it enables us to use our income in other areas of club development.

On the other side of the coin, some of our members (?) have been not quite so generous in paying their annual subscription (\$5) and match fees fo (\$1 per week). To date I have collected only \$240 in subs and \$540 in match fees. You don't have to be Einstein to realise that these are way down. By way of comparison some of our expenses relating solely to football this year are as follows: IDRU Levies \$620, Footballs and other gear \$342-60, Ground costs \$185-40, Laundry of gear \$147-50 and Advertising \$39-90. All in all the support of our members has been very good and I would like to thank everyone for their assistance, particularly the chaps who helped in the collection of match fees in the absence of team managers. In this field some of our blokes make the Scarlet Pimpernel look like an amateur.

The Social and Touring Committees once again operated independently. We have entered into an agreement with the Wollongong City Council to purchase the canteen on Keira Oval. This gives us exclusive trading rights to the canteen and a firm hold on the

ground for the next ten years. Our Social Committee has worked very hard and profitably from the canteen on our home games and Tewy and his cronies deserve a big pat on the back for their work in this area and also in the organisation of our recent very successful Annual Ball. The Touring Committee was off to rather a slow start with Joe Browne having been transferred to Darwin and Gavin Steele being out of town in his job. More recently Brian Silver has been doing a great job with the 200 clubs to raise money for the trip away. Latest reports indicate that this fund raising may almost fully pay for the trip.

After all this the club remains in a healthy financial position and available figures as at 30th September are as follows:—

Who said Waratahs weren't capable of winning a Grand Final. If only there were more kegs about!

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
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BARNEY LYONS MEMORIAL TROPHY
